SNAKES AND LADDERS AND OSCARS, OH MY!

Glamour is one of the most highly marketed aspects of showbiz. Fashion fortunes rise and fall on the red carpet during awards season leading up to the big night: the Academy Awards. In **Nathalie Atkinson's** Oscar-themed board, Champagne spills and red carpets replace snakes and ladders. As you play along at home, remember: There can be 100 people in the room and 99 don't believe in you, but all it takes is one person in your glam squad with a grudge to land you on the worst-dressed list

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HOW TO PLAY: Gather a die and small objects to use as game pieces (such as a thimble or a piece of candy). The object of the game is to be the first player to reach the last square. You do not need to land exactly on it to win. The youngest player goes first. Each turn, roll the die and move forward the number of spaces that you rolled. If you land on the bottom of a red-carpet staircase, move your piece up to the square at the top. If you land on a bottle, move your space down to the square where the Champagne spray stops. Turn then goes to the player on the left.
