Sarajevo, or Bosna-Serai, capital of Bosnia, where the Archduke Francis Little Sympathy, Though, Ex-Ferdinand and his wife were assassinated, is beautifully situated on both sides of the river Milyatska, 122 mile southwest of Belgrade.

The principal edifices are the toman Catholic Cathedral, Town Hall, sixteenth century mosque of Hall, sixteenth century mosque of master Bey, Governor's residence and museum, containing a collection of antiquities. There are ruins of a medieval castle built by Hungarians. The place has been greatly modernized under Austro-Hungary rule, and is a flourishing trade centre with railroad connections. It has manufacturers of tobacco and metal wares, and some textile establishments. The population is about 55,000 to 60,000.

The Archduke Charles Francis oseph is now next in succession to ie Austrian Throne. He fo the eldest son of the Archduke Otto, who was was born at Graz in 1865, and died in Vienna in 1906. He was married at Dresden in 1886 to Maria Josepha. Princess of Saxony, who is still living at Vienna. The only children of the marriage are the Archdukes Charles Francis Joseph and Maximilian Eugen marringe are the Archaukes Charles Francis Joseph and Maximilian Eugen Ludwig, the latter of whom is nineteen years old and a student of law. Charles Francis Joseph was born at Persenberg on August 17, 1887. He attended the Vienna public schools, something previously unheard of in his family, and to this association with the sons of workingmen the beginning of his popularity is said to be due. He is a Major in the 39th Austrian Infartry and holds honorary commissions in the 11th Prussian Hussars, the 1st Saxon Uhlans and the 13th Bavarian Infantry. Among the honorary orders of which he is a member are those of the Golden Fleece, the Black Eagle and St. Hubert. His wife was the Princess Zita of the Bourbon House of Parma. The Duchy was made a part of the Kingdom of Italy after the war of 1859, and since that time the principal residence of Schwarzau, not far from Vienna. It was here that the Princess was married October 21, 1911.
