

COERCING THE KING, CRY THE UNIONISTS

Lords Will Reject the Home Rule Bill

Parliament Act Will be Brought Into Play When Premier Asquith Presents the Measure to the King for His Signature.

(Canadian Associated Cable.) London, June 29.—While there has been a halt during June in the progress of the home rule bill toward the statute book, it will make its third appearance before the House of Lords on Wednesday.

Under the terms of this act Mr. Asquith, the Prime Minister, who is father of the present home rule scheme, will present the bill to the King for his signature, and with this it will become law.

After the bill itself the Lords will be called upon to consider the amending act, which will be introduced as a Government measure.

Tranquillity in Ireland.

With home rule pending, Ireland remains remarkably free from the fierce enmities and riotous bloodshed which have been the order of the day during former home rule crises.

The Viceroy of Ireland, Lord Aberdeen, the Right Honorable Augustine Birrell, the literary celebrity, who is Chief Secretary for Ireland, and the Irish Office in London, are mere spectators of events.

Nationalists Alarmed? If reports from Belfast are true, the Nationalist members of Parliament have become alarmed by the power of the army, and are trying to gain control by swamping it with Irishmen from the membership of the Order of Hibernians.

While the Ulster volunteers, with more than a year's training, form a very efficient military force, estimated at 100,000 men, the Ulster home rule imitators are yet a comparatively crude body.

Half the young men of Belfast are giving up their nights to drilling and Sundays to reviews and speeches. The two factions group strictly to their own sections, but when detachments of opposing forces meet they exchange salutes with all the formalities of hostile armies during a truce.

COFFERDAM BROKE.

SLAVIC EMBITTERMENT CAUSE OF TRAGEDY

COMMENT ON GERMAN PAPERS ON AUSTRIAN AFFAIR—SYM-PATHY FOR EMPEROR.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Berlin, June 29.—The Berlin morning papers, representing all parties, unite in declaring the Sarajevo tragedy to be the result of Slavic embitterment over Austria's internal policy.

The Tagessblatt says: The motive is Servian hatred for the Austro-Hungarian State. The Archduke and his wife have fallen as the victims of the passionate enmity which Austro-Hungarian policy of late years has awakened among the Servian people.

The Tagesszeitung declares that the crime is directly connected with the Servians' discontent at Austria's assistance in the creation of an Albanian State. It adds that the death of the Archduke is a great loss to Austria.

The Morgenpost expresses disquietude regarding possible consequences, and says: "General opinion will ascribe the crime to the Pan-Slavistic propaganda, and great efforts will be necessary to prevent it from having as eventful results for Europe as did the events at Prague preceding the thirty years' war."

General sympathy is expressed for Emperor Francis Joseph, even by the Socialists.

SERIOUS ANTI-SERVIAN OUTBREAK IN SARAJEVO

THE TROOPS HAD CONSIDERABLE DIFFICULTY IN QUELLING DISTURBANCE.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Sarajevo, June 29.—A bomb thrown by a youth standing on the corner of the main street of the Bosnian capital was the signal this morning for a serious anti-Servian outbreak, which the troops found considerable difficulty in quelling.

The manifestants paraded the streets with a portrait of the Emperor Francis Joseph at their head. They sang the Austrian national anthem, and attacked everything Servian until they were confronted by an overwhelming force of soldiers.

TECK AT FUNERAL

Duke Will Represent King George of England.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, June 29.—The Duke of Teck is to represent King George at the funeral of Archduke Francis Ferdinand, and not Prince Arthur of Connaught as had been reported.

MARTIAL LAW PROCLAIMED.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Sarajevo, June 29.—Martial law was proclaimed to-day both in the city and the district of Sarajevo in consequence of the assassination yesterday of Archduke Francis Ferdinand and the Duchess of Hohenberg.

OBJECTED TO "POLITICS."

Announcement of Temperance Parade Killed King's Printer.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Winnipeg, June 29.—When Rev. J. G. Hindley, pastor of Crescent Congregational Church, announced yesterday morning that a Temperance parade would be held Tuesday night under the auspices of the Christian Endeavor Society, James Hooper, King's Printer for Manitoba, jumped to his feet, exclaiming: "This is no place for discussing politics," and left the church.

HILLCREST FATHERLESS 159.

Ottawa, June 29.—According to an official report to the Labor Department from its special agent, J. D. Mc-Niven, who investigated the Hillcrest disaster, 86 married men and four widowers leaving children lost their lives. The fatherless children number 159.

DEATH MASKS TAKEN OF MURDERED COUPLE

Bodies Then Embalmed and Will Lie in State

Croatian Students Make Several Attempts to Punish the Serbs, but the Troops Were Called In and Preserved Order.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Sarajevo, Bosnia, June 29.—Death masks were taken to-day of the late Archduke Francis Ferdinand and of the Duchess of Hohenberg, who met their deaths at the hands of the young assassin, Gavrilo Princip, while on an official visit to the Bosnian capital. The bodies of the two victims were then embalmed and placed on a catafalque in the chapel of the palace, where they were surrounded by a magnificent display of wreaths and other floral emblems from all parts of the country.

According to the semi-official report of the tragedy at the time the fatal shots were fired, Field Marshal Josko Potiorek, Governor of Bosnia, was seated in the Archduke's motor-car. Count Francis von Harrach was standing on the footboard of the car, which was being driven by the Archduke's special bodyguard after the bomb had been thrown a short time before by Nedelejo Gabrinovitch.

Neither the Archduke nor the Duchess uttered a sound but a moment afterward the blood spurted in great gushes from the victims' mouths and throats, and it was seen that they had been mortally wounded.

Col. Moyzli Out of Danger.

Lieut. Col. Erik Mozzi, who had been wounded by the bomb in the first attack, was to-day pronounced out of danger, while the injury sustained by Count von Harrach is said to be insignificant.

The Croatian students here to-day made several attempts to punish the Serbs, but the troops were called and maintained order.

Gabrinovitch, it was learned to-day, had been expelled from Sarajevo two weeks ago, but had been recently permitted to return through the intervention of a Socialist member of the Bosnian Diet.

TASK OF THE MEDIATORS HAS BEEN ACCOMPLISHED

THEY WILL HOLD A FINAL SESSION AT NIAGARA FALLS TO-DAY.

(Special Despatch to The Globe.) Niagara Falls, Ont., June 29.—Significant developments in the Mexican peace situation are expected in the next day or two. Mr. De Gama, the Ambassador of Brazil, and the senior member of the Board of Mediation, who is at Long Branch with Madame De Gama, has been recalled by his colleagues, and is due here to-morrow.

The prospects are that when he reaches Niagara Falls the mediators will hold a final session for the purpose of determining whether to make an announcement that their particular work in the peace undertaking has ended and that the rest of the pacification program outlined here must be left to arrangement between the representatives of General Huerta and General Carranza.

According to the view expressed in the "Canadian Herald," the task of the mediators has been accomplished and no further occasion exists for the American plenipotentiaries to remain here any longer.

The position of those who are the producers who take this as their motto is that their mission has been successful.

HOLD ROYAL BURIAL MIDDLE OF NEXT WEEK

THE BODIES WILL NOT LIE IN STATE IN THE COURT CHAPEL.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Vienna, June 29.—The bodies of the murdered Archduke Francis Ferdinand and the Duchess of Hohenberg are to reach the Austrian capital to-morrow and will be buried in the middle of next week at Anstetten, upper Austria, in accordance with the wish of the late heir to the throne.

It has been decided that the bodies are not to lie in state in the Court Chapel here as the Duchess was not regarded as a member of the Imperial family. The lying in state, therefore, will take place either at St. Stephen's cathedral or the Heilighofen Chapel.

The bomb thrown by Nedelejo Gabrinovitch at Sarajevo yesterday is reported to have been made at the Servian gun factory at Kragevatz.
