

U.S. Government After Men Active in Montreal

(Canadian Press Desputches.) New York, July 2 .-- Arrests are due shortly in a big diamond smuggling city of gems worth \$700,000. Assistant U. S. Attorney Roger B. Wood has just returned from Montreal, where the plot. Mr. Wood refused to discuss he matter, but it is known that the muggling operations of the ring were

smuggling operations of the ring were disclosed in the investigation in a recent bankruptcy case.

During the investigation it was brought out that Joseph Samuels & Company, bankrupt braid manufacturers of 129 West Twentieth street, several members of which are under indictment, had extensive note transactions with Herman J. Dietz, a diamond importer of this city, who is also in bankruptcy. Dietz also had dealings with the bankrupt firm of Aaronson & Ruttenberg, diamond dealers, of Montreal. Many of the diamonds said to have been smuggled in from Montreal were pawned here. real were pawned here.

Montreal, July 2.—The firm of Aaronson and Ruttenberg is stated to-day to have had nothing to do with the diamond men in trouble in New York, except to sell them diamonds. It is said that one man was in the habit of coming to Montreal often to buy diamonds. The Montreal often to buy diamonds. The Montreal firm were not suspicious that an organized smuggling game was going on. They sold him the diamonds for which he paid, and they were not concerned about whether he paid duty or not. No information is obtainable locally to show that the New York firms mentioned were aware that the diamonds were smuggled.


