

JAPAN WILL STAND BY BRITISH ALLIANCE

Second Battle Squadron Has Assembled at Sasebo

Government is in Communication With British Government—Action Will be Taken if Ships of Triple Alliance at Tsing-Tau Attack British Vessels

Tokio, Aug. 2.—The Japanese navy has been prepared to meet any emergency, and the Minister of Marine, Vice-Admiral Rokuro Yashiro, yesterday went to Nikko to consult the Emperor on the international situation. In the meantime the second battle squadron had assembled at the naval station, Sasebo.

The Premier, Count Shigenobu Okuma, in a speech yesterday as to the gravity of the situation, said that to bring about a great peace a great war was sometimes unavoidable. He added that perhaps a general disturbance in Europe would resolve itself into the final war of the world, leading to permanent and industrial peace. The Japanese government had postponed its proclamation of neutrality between Austria-Hungary and Serbia, and is in constant communication with the British Government.

A Fair Warning. London, Aug. 2.—In regard to the Far East, the Japanese Ambassador, in London said yesterday that as long as the warships of the Triple Alliance remained at Tsing-Tau Japan would take no action against them, but should they attack British vessels or should Tsing-Tau be attacked, a serious war would ensue which would be dealt with by Japan in the spirit of the Anglo-Japanese Alliance.

VALCARTIER SELECTED AS MOBILIZATION BASE

HAD BEEN CHOSEN AS CAMP FOR TRAINING ARTILLERY—IS NEAR QUEBEC.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Quebec, Aug. 2.—In the event of Premier Borden's offer of an army division of 30,000 to 25,000 men being accepted Quebec will be the point of embarkation. Col. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, arrived here by special train this morning, and motored to Valcartier, about twenty miles away. This, he says, has been chosen as the mobilization base, and the probability is that thousands of troops may be pouring in here before next Sunday comes around, according to what the Minister told the Canadian Press correspondent.

Valcartier had already been selected as a camp some time ago, and was to have been a training ground for artillery. The camp area is about ten miles square, and Colonel Hughes considers it will be an ideal spot for mobilization, owing to its proximity to Quebec, the nature of the country and the fact that there is a plentiful supply of water.

KRONPRINZESSIN CECELIE SENDS WIRELESS MESSAGE

VESSEL CARRYING MILLIONS IN GOLD SKIRTING THE NORTH OF THE BRITISH ISLES.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, Aug. 2.—The North German Lloyd steamship Kronprinzessin Cecelie signalled by wireless to Malin Head at 4:15 this morning. The position of the vessel was not ascertained.

Malin Head is the northernmost point of Ireland. The Kronprinzessin Cecelie left New York last week for Bremen by way of Plymouth and Cherbourg. She has on board \$10,600,000 in gold.

In ordinary circumstances the Kronprinzessin Cecelie would have communicated first with the Fastnet station, off the southern coast of Ireland. It is believed, therefore, that the vessel is skirting the north of the British Isles with the intention of entering the North Sea and making her way direct to some German port.

BERLINERS READY TO REPORT.

German and Hollanders in the Reserve Militia.

(Special Despatch to The Globe.) Berlin, Ont., Aug. 2.—Keep interest is manifested in the war situation in this city. Bulletins at the newspaper offices kept citizens informed as to events during the day. There are quite a number of German and Dutch residents here, and the reserve militia lists in Germany and Holland, are expected to report to the nearest Consul when mobilization orders are issued. About ten Germans and Hollanders in Berlin and Waterloo will report in Toronto early to-morrow morning.

CANADA HAS OFFERED AID TO GREAT BRITAIN

In every possible way for that purpose, wish to convey to his Majesty's Government the firm assurance that if unhappily war should ensue, the Canadian people will be united in a common resolve to put forth every effort, and to make every sacrifice necessary to insure the integrity and maintenance of the honor of our Empire."

Britain's Reply.

The following reply was received this afternoon from Mr. Harcourt: "With reference to your telegram, August 1, His Majesty's Government gratefully welcome the assurance that in the present crisis they may rely on the whole-hearted co-operation of the people of Canada."

All Differences Sunk in Presence of Crisis

The Government, representing all the people of Canada, is taking prompt action to back up that assurance of help. There are no political differences in the present crisis. Sir Wilfrid Laurier sent word yesterday that he was cutting short his holiday in Arthabaska and starting at once for the capital. He arrived to-night, and is ready to co-operate with Premier Borden in all necessary measures for the assistance of the motherland and the defence of the Empire. Other Liberal leaders will be here to-morrow on the same mission.

Cabinet Meeting Constantly.

The Cabinet has been in session almost continuously since Sir Robert Borden's return from Muskoka yesterday morning. The official offer of assistance was despatched at the conclusion of yesterday afternoon's sitting. This morning another emergency meeting was held to further consider the many pressing and vital problems which have suddenly arisen. A special issue of The Canadian Gazette was authorized in compliance with a request received early this morning from the Imperial Government, asking the Canadian Government to notify all men of the Royal Naval Reserve now in Canadian territory to report at once to the nearest British Consular or colonial naval officer for duty. The special issue of the Gazette, printed at once at the Government Printing Bureau, is now being mailed to all parts of the country.

Naval Reserves Ordered Home.

The Royal Naval Reserves constitute the second line of reservists, and consist of men who have had a naval training corresponding to that of the volunteer militia. There are several hundred of them in Canada. The Naval Reserves, or the men who have seen actual service in the British navy, were quietly notified by mail more than a week ago to report at once to the Admiralty, and numbers of these have already started for England on the last steamers leaving Montreal. The naval reserve men in Canada were notified last week through the medium of the Canadian Naval Department, but it was done

Thousands of Citizens Give a Rousing Send-off

PATHETIC LEAVE-TAKINGS

Prayers Offered in Churches—Newspapers Got Out Extras—Offices Besieged All Day—Trainloads of Excursionists in the City.

News Spread Quickly.

The news was bulletined and quickly spread over the city. In addition prayers were offered in city churches, and London had the unusual experience of newspaper extras published on Sunday. The result was that thousands of people besieged the newspaper offices all day, and those with the trainloads of excursionists coming into the city for the London Old Boys' Reunion, which commenced to-day, heightened the excitement of the day. By the time the International Limited pulled out there was no standing room left on the station platform.

BRITISH ARMY AND NAVY RESERVISTS CALLED

MANY MEN WILL SAIL FROM NEW YORK ON LUSITANIA NEXT TUESDAY.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) New York, Aug. 2.—All British army and navy reservists in America are to be called out. Instructions to this effect were received here to-day from the British Foreign Office by Acting Consul-General Nosworthy. Many of the reservists, it is expected, will sail for England on the steamer Lusitania next Tuesday.

Entire Cabinet Summoned.

All the absent members of the Cabinet are hurrying back to the Capital in response to a summons sent out on Friday by Premier Borden. At to-morrow morning's meeting it is expected that all the Ministers will be present, with the exception of Hon. Messrs. Burrell and Lougheed, who are en route from the West; Hon. Dr. Roche, who is convalescing in Rochester from his recent operation, and Hon. George Perley, who is in England. His Royal Highness the Governor-General is speeding towards the Capital by special train from Banff, and is expected to arrive to-morrow night.

Several Thousands Have Volunteered

At the Militia Department the usual Sabbath quiet has been replaced by hurried preparations for war. Offers to go on active service have been pouring in for the past forty-eight hours. They represent all sections of Canada, and all branches of the militia service. Up to 6 o'clock to-night the number of volunteers, as represented by the offers of their commanding officers, was approximately 7,000. In the list are ten infantry regiments, four cavalry corps, four batteries of field artillery, and three engineering corps.

Arranging for Mobilization.

Col. Sam Hughes, after attending a Cabinet Council meeting last evening, left on a hurried train to Quebec to inspect the defences there and arrange for rush orders for ammunition and rifles. He came back to the Capital on a late train to-night. The department is busy to act on a minute's notice in putting the machinery in motion for the mobilization of a Canadian army division. The total number of men that will be mobilized at once has not yet been determined, pending to-morrow's meeting of the Cabinet, and the character of the request from the Imperial Government.

First Contingent Would Comprise 21,000

According to tentative plans, the Canadian expeditionary force will consist of about 21,000 men, including 3 infantry brigades of 12 regiments, or 12,000 men; 3 brigades of field artillery, comprising 9 batteries of 36 guns and 1,500 men, a brigade of howitzers with 800 men, one heavy battery with 200 men, a cavalry squadron of 160 men, 2 field companies of engineers of 160 men, a signal company of 160 men, an army service corps of 450 men, and 3 field ambulance corps of 700 men. The men of the permanent staff will form the nucleus of the first contingent.

A Thousand From Vancouver.

Vancouver, Aug. 2.—The 5th Regiment of Vancouver has wired the Government at Ottawa offering one thousand men at once.

Navy Reservists Called

(Special Despatch to The Globe.) Ottawa, Aug. 2.—The Admiralty has issued a call for Royal Naval Reservists to report for duty at once. The Canadian Government has been asked to make the announcement. Men of the Royal Naval Reserve are asked to accept this as notification, and report.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT CONTROL ALL WIRELESS
