

CANADIAN TROOPS LEAVE FOR HALIFAX

Toronto and London Contingents Go On Special Trains

BIG CROWD AT STATION

Major-General Lessard in Interview Says No Mobilization in Progress Yet—Departure of Companies for Halifax to Strengthen Garrison.

A practical response to Great Britain's expected appeal for support in case of a forced recourse to arms was made by the Canadian permanent forces yesterday, when Toronto and London detachments made hurried exits from their respective depots and speeded for Halifax, where they will remain until "further orders."

War preparations have been made. The excitement at Stanley Barracks yesterday was akin to the feelings of those who prepared for service in South Africa. While the war spirit did not prevail, the utmost enthusiasm characterized the actions of the men, who moved with alacrity under hasty commands, and as usual disorderly order prevailed. Sunday leave was cancelled. Accommodations and provisions of war were made ready for the shipment. The men organized their complete service outfits, were apportioned rations, and left for the Union Station at 7.30 p.m. The contingent consisted of 69 non-commissioned officers and men of the "C" Company of the Royal Canadian Regiment, under the command of Captain E. K. Eaton. Scene at Station.

A large crowd of relatives and friends gathered within the precincts of the Union Station, while greater numbers crowded on to York street bridge to catch a glimpse and give a cheer to the departing soldiers. The scene inside the station was a replica of what happened fourteen years ago. The men were rushed into their coaches and only allowed to converse with their friends from the windows. From which they exhibited their regimental pets. The usual accompaniment of pathetic leave-taking was conspicuous by its absence, the consensus of opinion among the crowd being that the preliminary movement of the men to Halifax would be complete in itself. But the officers would make no statement, not knowing what their ultimate destination would be.

Cheers and counter-cheers were heard by the civilians as the soldiers like as the Grand Trunk flyer steamed out of the station at 8.30. They were turned into apparent scorn at a salute as a number of Austrians, booked for Montreal, and the steamer, sailed along the pier for their train. Major John Kaye, who commands the Toronto contingent, remained in Toronto until this morning, to see the departure of the companies. Seen by the crowd as they were being loaded on to the movement to the eastern seaboard by the British and the soldiers of the Army Council in regard to possible shipment of troops to Europe.

To Strengthen Garrison. "No mobilization is in progress as yet. We are waiting orders from the War Office before a general mobilization begins," said Major-General F. L. Lessard to The Globe last night.

General Lessard said that the departure of the Toronto and London companies of the Royal Canadian Regiment for Halifax was for the purpose of strengthening the garrison, and that it was virtually the entrance to Canada.

The Royal Canadian Regiment is trying there at present, and the soldiers of the various companies seem to be more in the nature of a precautionary measure than the beginning of a mobilization.

WORKMAN DROWNED IN TORONTO BAY

Daniel Crawford Perishes Off Fisherman's Island

THREE OTHERS RESCUED

"Red" O'Neill Taken From Water at Foot of Bathurst Street in Unconscious Condition—Two Thrown From Canoe.

Daniel Crawford, an employee of Herron Brothers, contractors, was drowned off Fisherman's Island at 7.30 Saturday evening. "Red" O'Neill was picked out of the water unconscious at the foot of Bathurst street at 8 o'clock last night. Wm. Maurer and G. Brickerberg were also rescued at the foot of York street at 8.30. They were thrown out of their canoe.

The above is a budget of accidents which happened in and near the Toronto Bay during the week-end. Daniel Crawford, who was living in a contractor's shanty on the island, and was an expert swimmer, entered the water on Saturday evening shortly after partaking of a meal. He swam a short distance, but was seized with cramps and sank. On rising to the surface he cried for help. Wm. McCormack, a fellow employee, dived after him, but the effort proved futile. The foreman, "Andy" Gallagher, rushed to the scene, and hauled Crawford out of the water with a pole. In the meantime the life-saving crew were cut on the arms and breast. He was unconscious when picked up.

Another call was responded to by the life-saving crew at 6.10 last evening, when a message was received from the foot of Bathurst street, where it was declared a man was drowned. The victim of this accident was badly hurt after falling from a height into the water. "Red" O'Neill, carrying the huge 65-foot shear-legs standing near the foot of Bathurst street, climbed to the top, then toppled over and fell, falling flat on the water, and sustaining serious cuts on the arms and breast. He was unconscious when picked up.

Captain Chapman, of the Island Life-saving Station, wrapped the man up in a blanket, after administering first aid, and had him conveyed to the General Hospital, where he was declared to be resting easily last night. O'Neill was picked out of the water by Wm. Goodman, 374 Adelaide street west, and Arthur Colquhoun, 21 Niagara street.

A further call on the services of the life-saving crew was made at 8.30, when a message was received from the foot of the bay. It is believed that the man was drowned in the night.

BIG POLICEMAN HELPS IRISH GIRL IN DISTRESS

OPENS SUBSCRIPTION AND COLLECTS RAILWAY FARE TO BERLIN.

The loss of her purse containing \$20 and a bank book showing an account of \$300 was the cause of great distress and anxiety to a little Irish girl at the Union Station last night. She wished to go to Berlin, Ont., but finding herself penniless she did the best possible thing under the circumstances. She carried her tale of misfortune to P.C. Southern. Always ready to help those in distress, the big policeman immediately opened a subscription and was soon able to collect over \$3.00, which he handed to the grateful girl.

The little girl purchased her ticket and departed for Berlin, Ontario, and the bank would be notified of the loss of her pass-book.

THREE PEOPLE INJURED IN RADIAL CAR ACCIDENT

MAJORITY OF PASSENGERS BADLY SHAKEN—TRACKS BLOCKED AN HOUR.

A rear-end collision occurred on the York Radial railway near Constable George Simpson's house on the Lake Shore road last night. Three people were injured, and the majority of the passengers were badly shaken. Miss Currie of Mimico, who received some-what severe injuries to her head, was conveyed to Mr. Simpson's house, where she received medical attention by Dr. Forbes Godfrey. Another woman, whose name is unknown, received a badly sprained ankle.

The cars were heavily laden with holiday and picnic crowds returning to the city after a day along the lake shore, when the driver on the rear car is said to have lost control of his charge, and crashed into the other car, which was at a standstill. The tracks were blocked for nearly an hour, but were subsequently cleared by the company's wrecking gang.
