

MOBILIZATION PLANS OF CANADA COMPLETED

Officials Only Await Word From the Government

TRAINING AT VALCARTIER

Camp Near Quebec Will be Temporarily Fortified—The Niobe to be Manned and Prepared for Active Service.

(Special Despatch to The Globe.) Ottawa, Aug. 3.—Mobilization plans of the Militia Department are practically completed, and all that the Minister of Militia and his staff are now waiting for, is the instruction from the Government on receipt of a special call for help from the motherland. Quebec has been selected as the centre of mobilization, and already the permanent forces of the Royal Canadian Regiment and the Field Artillery are gathered there, with the exception of the regulars stationed at Halifax and its vicinity.

The department has prepared to mobilize an army division at Quebec within one week of the issuance of the final order. A manoeuvring area was recently acquired by the Government at Valcartier, a few miles northeast of Quebec, and the troops will be encamped there for a week or so for training purposes, pending arrangements for transport. These latter arrangements are now being made with the British War Office and the Admiralty, and it is expected that the details will be completed within a day or two.

Fortifying the Camp.

Meanwhile the Militia Department will temporarily fortify the camp at Quebec. A contract was let this afternoon for some four or five miles of trenches at Valcartier, and officers of the engineering staff left here to superintend the work and also to prepare the camp ground.

Will Man the Niobe.

The Naval Department is making hurried preparations to man the Niobe and put her in readiness for active service. The presence of two German cruisers somewhere in the North Atlantic is causing considerable uneasiness, but the Niobe carries a heavier armament than either of the German vessels. Nothing is given out as to the whereabouts of British war vessels on this side of the Atlantic, but it is known that there are several, and that under present circumstances there need be little to fear from any ships of the enemy, unless other cruisers make their way across the ocean from the North Sea, with a view to sporadic raids on Canadian ports and shipping.

Naval Reservists to be Used.

With the consent of the British Admiralty naval reservists in Canada will be used to man the Niobe, and Admiral Kingsmill will take command of the Niobe and the other vessels on the Atlantic coast. All Dominion Government steamers not already in port have been ordered to return at once and to remain in harbor.

Special Session to be Summoned.

The officials of Parliament are making arrangements to summon the members for a special session, to vote funds and take all other requisite measures in case it becomes necessary to send a Canadian expeditionary force to England. Pending the voting of funds by Parliament arrangements are being made for Governor-General's warrants under order in Council.

To Confer with ex-Minister.

As an indication of the co-operation which may be expected between Liberals and Conservatives in the present crisis, Colonel Hughes stated to-night that the ex-Minister of Militia, Sir Frederick Borden, would be asked to give his advice and assistance in arranging for the mobilization and equipping and despatching of Canadian troops.

All Classes Offering.

The Militia Department was again inundated to-day with another flood of offers to enlist, coming from all parts of the Dominion. Almost all the regiments and every branch of the service, covering every province, are represented. Apparently the whole militia service of Canada is ready to respond at once to the call to arms. Several members and ex-members of Parliament have sent in telegrams offering themselves for active service or volunteering to raise men. A score of young women have telegraphed asking to be sent as Red Cross nurses.

Cadet Corps are not behind the growth-ups in offering to fight for the flag.

From Montreal comes an offer through E. I. D'Hozy to raise a company of the colored citizens of that city. R. B. Bennett, M.P., of Calgary, telegraphs the Minister of Militia that he can raise a thousand men for active service. Glen Campbell, ex-M.P., wires from Winnipeg, offering to raise and com-

Sir Donald's offer, made to Col. Hon. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, is to go with the forces wherever they may be dispatched.

pled that he could not possibly give a response before consulting the Imperial Chancellor and the German Emperor. He intimated that he doubted whether it was possible to give an answer, because that answer would disclose the German plans.

"We were sounded last week as to whether, if Belgian neutrality were restored after the war, it would pacify us, and we replied that we could not barter our interests or our obligations."

Foreign Minister Grey declared that England would suffer little more if she should intervene in the war than if she stood aside while, in the latter event she "would lose the respect of the world, and this would counter-balance any saving there might be."

British Forces Prepared.

"So far as the forces of the Crown are concerned, the Premier and First Lord of the Admiralty have no doubt whatever of their readiness and their efficiency. They never were at a higher mark of readiness. There never was a time when confidence was more justly placed in the ability to protect our shores and our commerce."

Loss Will be Heavy.

"If we are in a crisis of this kind we run away from our obligations of honor and duty with regard to the Belgian treaty I doubt whether whatever material force we might possess at the end would be of much value in the face of the respect we should have lost."

FRANCE IS NOT TO BLAME.

"That is our starting point, and that statement clears the ground as to the settlement of our obligations."

IRLAND UNITED IN CRISIS.

John Redmond, the Irish leader, electrified the House of Commons this afternoon when in an impassioned address he declared that the Government can withdraw every soldier from Ireland.
